

How many new grad RNs are in the Hawaii workforce and where do they work?




11% of RNs are new grads.

What is the educational background of the new grad RN workforce?


3 in 4 new grad RNs were educated in the state of Hawaii.



Where are new grad RNs finding jobs?

Desired and Actual First Nursing Job Setting New Grad RNs





Myth: There are no jobs for new grad RNs in Hawaii.

Fact: 95% of new grad RNs from local schools, living in Hawaii, are currently working in license-relevant roles in the state. **88%** of locally educated new grad RNs joined the workforce within one year of graduation.



Myth: Hospitals don't want to hire new grad RNs.

Fact: The percentage of RNs who work in hospitals has decreased from **62% to 42%** over the last 15 years. The number of new grad RNs that hospitals hire is appropriate for the total share of the workforce that they employ.




Myth: Hawaii loses large numbers of new grad RNs to out-of-state employers.

Fact: Schools have difficulty keeping track of their graduates so we are unable to estimate how many new grad RNs leave to work out of state. However, our best data suggest that about 90% of local students remain in Hawaii after graduation.
