

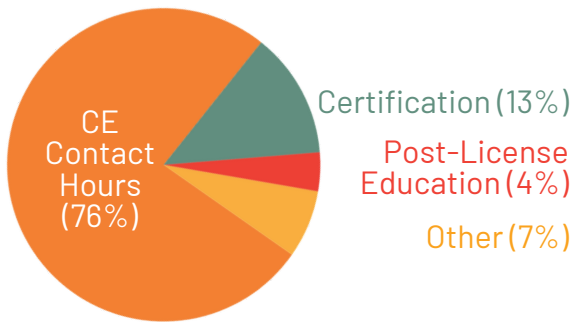

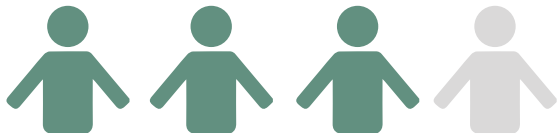

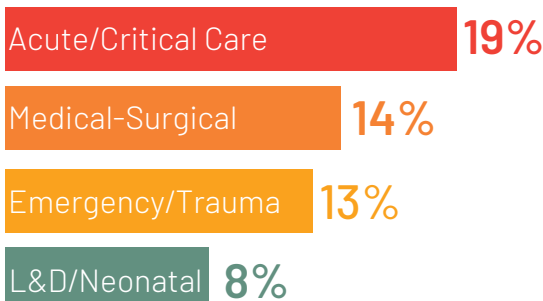

According to the Campaign for Action (2017), Hawai'i's statewide BSN rate is the highest in the country.

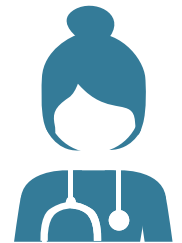
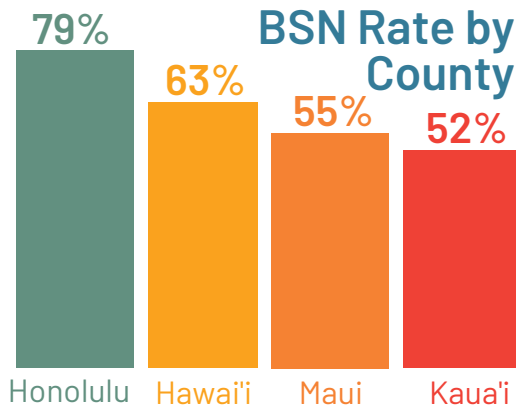
